

Dear friends in Jesus Christ,

After the beautiful celebration of Christmas, we had two other great celebrations centered in the last two weekends, namely the solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord and the Baptism of the Lord respectively. In the Epiphany celebrations we had three wise men from the East, who manifested about the glorious birth of Jesus to the world. In the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, we had St. John the Baptist who manifests the greatness of Jesus by saying, "I am baptizing you with water, but one mightier than I is coming. I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." Today we have a beautiful Gospel passage, where Jesus is manifesting Himself by changing water into wine. According to the Gospel of John, Jesus begins His public ministry with this great miracle.

As we reflect about this beautiful Gospel passage, the central theme of the Gospel is "Change". A change that is happening before and after the intercession and intervention of Mary and Jesus respectively. As Christians, we know that the whole mission of Jesus is directed towards a change leading His people to the Kingdom of God. Thus, Jesus is born for a Change, lived for a Change, died for a Change and His resurrection also is for a Change. If we cannot experience and nourish this greatest change in our lives, it is an indication that we need to change and to that change; Mother Mary is calling us by saying; "Do whatever He tells you."

Today every one of us is looking for a change in the present situation of the world. Even when we are talking about and praying for a change, how many of us do really and sincerely reflect about a change that should happen personally in our lives, according to the words of Mother Mary in today's Gospel; "Do whatever He tells you?" Dear friends, believe me, we are all participating in a celebration where we remember the passion, death and resurrection of a God who can turn the mess into a message. It is the same God called Jesus that we see in today's Gospel, who changed water into wine who is truly present at this altar. It is the same miracle of Jesus who is changing wine and bread into His own body and blood and coming to each one of us through the

Holy Eucharist. But, how many of us truly believe this greatest truth?

Mary says to Jesus—"They have no wine," and the reply of Jesus is that "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not come." Apparently, the response of Jesus to His Mother Mary is very rude, but it could be a response to every one of us who are disheartened with unfulfilled prayers. Yes, let us wait for Jesus' hour into our needed situation rather than forcing Jesus to act according to our hour of time. The response of Jesus; "My hour has not come" is a perfect time period Jesus is giving us to listen and to act according to His words. This is what Mary is telling to the servants there; "Do whatever he tells you." Yes, listening to Jesus is the only way to experience miracles in our lives, and be sure that miracles will be much appreciated, greater than before like the headwaiter who tasted the new wine of Jesus.

Dear friends, as we are aspiring for a good and peaceful life in this world, let us thirst for a new wine prepared by Jesus every day rather than the wine prepared by this world. For, "Jesus stood up and exclaimed, 'Let anyone who thirsts come to me and drink.'" (Jn.7:37) **God Bless!**
