

Dear Friends in Jesus Christ,

One day it seems a certain curious person in heaven asked St. Peter, "How many Hindus are there in heaven?" St. Peter replied, "No Hindus." Then he asked, "How many Muslims?" "Not even one." The man was surprised. He said: "Oh, then, there are only Christians in heaven? "No, there are no Christians in heaven either." "How many Catholics?" "No Catholics either". Then Peter said: "Heaven is not meant for any particular group of people." All are welcome here. In heaven there is no distinction between Hindus, Muslims or Christians, but all enjoy the loving presence of God. The Gospel of today gives us the message that no one is excluded from the love of God; rather, anyone with faith in God is welcomed to enjoy His blessings.

The men dominated Society of Jesus' time believed and propagated that salvation is only possible for Jews and not for Gentiles. Jews always condemned Gentiles as unclean dogs and dishonored them whenever it was possible. Jews even taught that Gentiles are excluded from God's Commandments and Love. It is in this background of the society we should see the interaction of Jesus with the Canaanite woman in today's Gospel.

In the Gospel of Matthew 10:5, we see Jesus is commissioning His disciples by saying, "Do not visit pagan territory and do not enter a Samaritan town. Go instead after the lost sheep of Israel." Today we see Jesus Himself takes an initiative to go to the Gentiles regions like Tyre and Sidon. Yes, Jesus is initiating a great transformation in the traditional beliefs and customs of Jews by interacting with the Canaanite woman. The Canaanite woman cry out "Have Pity on me Lord, Son of David! My daughter is tormented by a demon". If you remember last weekend's Gospel we can still hear the cry of St. Peter, "Lord Save me." If we compare the cry of St. Peter and the Canaanite woman, we can find that the Canaanite woman did a better job than Peter; so Jesus says, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish". Yes, a cry with faith will never be neglected from the hands of God. The greatness of the woman's faith is that she believed and professed her faith in Jesus before the fulfillment of her great need. The great woman addressed Jesus as Lord, Son of David, but last weekend, it was after everything calmed down the disciples said "Truly, you are the Son of God." Today, as we sit before the Lord, we need to ask a question, "why am I here today?" Am I waiting for a miracle to happen in my life through this Eucharist to strengthen my faith in Jesus like Peter and the other disciples? Or, am I here with a strong faith like the Canaanite woman to thank the Lord for all the blessings received and for all the blessings anticipated?

There is no doubt; most of us have gone through a feeling of rejection and humiliation from God and from others just like the Canaanite woman in today's Gospel. Jesus' response to the Canaanite woman's request was really embarrassing. Jesus says, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel....It is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs." Yes, Jesus says to her very clearly that, she is not disqualified by her birth to receive the blessings, but we see she qualifies herself excellently by her strong faith in Jesus. Yes, Jesus always appreciated the quality of Faith, and Jesus could see the quality of faith more among the Gentiles than among His own people; remember the story of the ten lepers, the Good Samaritan etc.

Yes, dear friends, the qualification to get blessings from God is our true Faith in God. So before we pray, we shall not forget to check the quality of our faith in God. "O, man and woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." **God Bless you.**

Guidelines for Resuming Parish Gatherings
Outside the Liturgy

Effective immediately (July 1, 2020), parish gatherings outside the liturgy (parish picnics, faith formation gatherings, RCIA meetings, etc.) as well as non-parish sponsored events held by groups renting or using parish facilities or property.

- Limit the persons in attendance to no more than 50% of the maximum permitted occupancy capacity of the space.
- Maintain physical distance of six feet minimum from those not living within the same household.
- Wear face covering over mouth and nose. Based on CDC recommendations, everyone over the age of two must wear a mask for the duration of any event held on parish property if closer than six feet to anyone not living within the same household. Those unable to wear a face mask at the event, whether it be due to age, health condition, or preference, are asked to stay healthy at home.
- Conduct temperature and health checks for each participant.
- Ensure proper, frequent cleaning and sanitation of the gathering space, including restrooms.
- Encourage those at high risk to stay Healthy at Home.
